



#### HABITAT FOR HUMANITY DECEMBER 18, 2005

#### HOUSE KEYS PRESENTED TO THE GIANG FAMILY



Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit, non-government organization dedicated to improving the lives of economically disadvantaged persons through ownership. From Mississauga to Pickering, many families live in newly constructed or renovated homes. HFHT has also renovated a 10 000 square foot historic building known as Mary's Home which provides emergency shelter for 32 homeless women. This is in conjunction with the St. Vincent de Paul Society and the Out of the Cold Programme.

Recipients of the homes must meet certain criteria. Since they must commit 500 hours during the construction of their home, a deep commitment and bond exists within the communities.

Along with other members of other RTO districts and other corporate sponsors, I had the pleasure of attending the Edu-Build at the Malvern site in Scarborough. It was even more meaningful because one of our fellow retirees from Toronto District actually taught members of the extended family who received their keys that day. The dignitaries who spoke also had donated hours of manual labour.

Representing District 24 were: Elaine Aprile, Ken Turton, Brenda & Gary Fick, Robyn Allin, Val Savolainen and Sandra McNabney.

#### HEALTH SERVICES AND INSURANCE NEWS



Hello again! And although you are reading this in March, I want to wish you a Happy New Year! I hope 2006 is a safe, healthy and fulfilling year for you and your family.

If you attended District 24's AGM in October you heard me report that effective January 1, 2006 your RTO health premiums would be increasing by 10% for Semi-Private Hospital, and 15% for Extended Health Care and Dental. The following is a list of other important plan changes which you may not be aware of as yet:

- the maximum for the Extended Health Care Plan's Prescription Drug benefit increases to \$1900
- ✓ the Aids and Appliances "Post Surgical Convenience Items" benefit increases to \$100 per insured person in any two consecutive years
- ✓ the lifetime maximum for the Out-of-Province/Canada "Emergency Medical Benefit" changes to a per-trip maximum of \$1 million
- ✓ the Out of Province/Canada "Repatriation of Remains" benefit now includes burial at place of death
- ✓ the Semi-private Hospital Plan's Convalescent Care benefit now includes non-elective day surgeries, to a maximum of one day or \$50 per calendar year
- ✓ the Dental Plan now reimburses claimants based on the 2006 fee guide
- ✓ the definition of the Extended Health Care Plan's Out-of-Province/Canada "Sudden and Unforeseen Medical Stability Clause" now includes the following parameters:

1. Any cancer, heart or lung condition for which, in the 90 days prior to your date of departure (or

date of booking for purposes of Trip Cancellation):

- ✓ you were awaiting the outcome of medical tests (except routine monitoring), the results of which show any irregularities or abnormalities
- ✓ except routine monitoring, you require future investigation, consultation with any physician, treatment or surgery recommended by your physician or planned before your trip
- ✓ you required hospitalization; or

**2.** Any condition for which you have been advised by your physician not to travel.

Transfer to the RTO/ERO Health Plans from RTIP/ARM plans requires medical evidence of insurability.



#### NEWS FROM THE DISTRICT UPDATERS

#### > USING THAT REMOTE TO UNLOCK YOUR CAR DOORS



Our last issue had a District Updater item on opening your car doors using your cell phone and the spare set you keep at home when you've locked your keys in your car. Ooooops... it seems that information was inaccurate.

"Comforting though it may be to imagine you can unlock your car door in an emergency by receiving a distant signal from your cell phone, it can't possibly work - not with the technology as it now stands. It seems that your remote car key operates by sending a weak, encrypted radio signal to a receiver inside your car, which in turn activates the door locks.

The system works on radio waves, not sound. The only way for a signal from your spare remote to be picked up by the cell phone and relayed to your car's onboard receiver would be if both phones were capable of sending exactly the same frequency as the remote itself. This is not possible given that all remote entry devices operate at frequencies between 300 and 500 MHz, while all mobile phones, by law, operate at 800MHz and higher."
