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History District 24 Scarborough & East York

Our name hearkens back to our roots in 1968 when we were first established to serve the needs of retired teachers of Ontario. Since then, we have extended our membership to welcome all Ontario educational support staff from schools and school boards, as well as college and university faculty. District 24 is one of 51 RTOERO Districts. At the District level, members participate in social, travel and leisure opportunities, political advocacy and District Executive leadership roles. At the Provincial level, members are actively involved in the Forum (the governing body of RTO/ERO), the Provincial Executive and several committees.



The History of the Early years of district 24 was included in the special book of memories. The early days of District 24 have been taken from documents prepared by Dr. Robert Lamb. His document "Superannuated Teachers of Ontario" provides a very detailed history of our Ontario Teachers' Pension from its beginnings in 1853.

It was known then as the Ryerson Pension Fund for the support of "**superannuated or worn out Common School Teachers of Upper Canada**." In 1860 the average pension was \$26.54. In 1885 the Fund was closed to all except those who were members, so no further grants were provided and the plan was phased out. No pension plan was available to new teachers until 1917 unless it were provided by an urban school board under 1904 legislation.

The Teachers' and Inspectors' Superannuation Act (1917) act provided a funded or "Reserve" plan for pensions which required from the government and the parties at first, more money than appeared necessary, but which would provide for future stability as pension demands increased. In December 1968, a committee was established to organize STO/ERO into geographic areas across Ontario, based on the provincial county board system. That resulted in 10 areas, which grew to 12 in 1970. In 1972, the province was reorganized into 21 subdivisions which would be known as districts. The senate created the districts, which would each have at least three executive members. District 24 had not sprung into being without the efforts of many people who had a dream about banding together a group of retired teachers from Scarborough and East York into an association. Its inception was in 1972.

Origin of District 24, Superannuated Teachers of Ontario



In 1971 Miss Marian Tyrell, Secretary of the Provincial S.T.O. and Norman McLeod, an S.T.O. executive member, asked Jim Wilkinson, a retired publicschool principal in Scarborough, to organize a Scarborough-East York District. It was to be made up of retired men and women teachers from the Public, Separate and Secondary Schools.

Mr. Wilkinson contacted Mrs. Irene Pantaleo re the Separate School people and some of the Public-School women lined up their people. Contact through the school boards was made with all the retired secondary teachers and the elementary men teachers. An organizing Committee was set up with representatives from all the groups. The first meeting of the Scarborough – East York District was held on February 16 1972. The members met in the old Oakridge School in Scarborough.

Jim Wilkinson called the meeting to order and explained the purpose of the branch:

- 1. To receive S.T.O. information
- 2. To have a representative on the Senate
- 3. To participate in the work to improve pensions and life in general for S.T.O. members
- 4. To arrange social occasions

Forty-two superannuated teachers were present, representing FWTAO, OPSMTF, OSSTF, and OECTA.

The late Norman McLeod, formerly the principal of Leaside High School, then addressed the meeting and gave an extremely informative talk on the history of the STO, including its origin (it was formed in 1968), purpose, and achievements. He then called for nominations for the positions of executive officers for the new district.


The elections were as follows:
